C 0408 TOWN MAYOR'S REMARKS

The Town Mayor welcomed everyone to the meeting, and shared that he had been to and enjoyed the afternoon matinee of Murder on the Nile. He had also attended Churchers College annual academic year event, where the speaker had been a bodyguard to Nelson Mandela.

The Mayor reminded members that it was Remembrance Sunday on 12th November and members were invited to attend the civic event, as well as assist with refreshments at the Avenue Pavilion afterwards. Members were also reminded that the switching on of the Christmas Lights would be held on 24th November from 5 pm with late night shopping until 8.00 pm

C 0413 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Litter Stakeholder Forum

Mrs Svarovska belonged to Petersfield Society and had lived in Petersfield for 8 years. She had organised litter picking recently and it was good to have the Town Mayor involved in this. It was generally felt that there were few litter problems in Petersfield but there were some definite hot spots.

The proposal was for a group to be formed from the public and private sector, who would either take care of the area near to them, or organise litter picks. A group of people had met recently including Cllr J Matthews, Julie Yardley members of Petersfield Society and others, and it had been suggested that help could be broadened through businesses and organisations such as fast food chains and schools in an effort to reduce and prevent litter. Support had also been received from East Hampshire District Council (Michelle Green and Lucy Whittle). It was noted that Beth was very good at co-ordinating this effort, but Beth hoped that some form of co-ordination and control would come from one of the local government organisations to add strength and focus to the cause. It was considered that East Hampshire District Council may be in a better situation as they may have more resource.

Better co-ordination was also required when work such as hedge cutting was taking place, as many hedges were used to discard litter which would then be visible once the hedge had been cut. If information of work was available, then local organisations or individuals could be called upon to follow up with litter clearance.

Members received some 'humorous' examples of notices that had been used in New Zealand. One idea would be to run a competition for ideas, possibly in the Petersfield Post.

The next litter pick was planned for 24th March 2018, and Beth was hoping to organise at least two a year.

It was agreed that this topic would be discussed further at the November Grounds Committee Meeting

Electoral Boundary Proposal

Ms L Bevan raised several concerns regarding the recent electoral boundaries proposal, and that it was noted in the documentation that Petersfield Town Council had not given any feedback at the initial meetings. It was noted that members and officers had attended one of the initial meetings but there had been no indication of the kinds of changes now being proposed, so at that time there was no concerns to be raised. However, since the release of the full Electoral Boundary Proposal, the Town Council had proactively noted some concerns which would be discussed later in this meeting.

C 0414 DOLPHIN COURT CAR PARK

Members received a brief presentation of the Dolphin Court Car Park proposals from a team representing Thorncliffe. The plan is to build 13 apartments and a number of retail units, opening the area up from Dragon Street with three gabled buildings facing out onto Dragon Street. The mosaic of Petersfield, which is currently integrated into the wall, will be carefully moved, cleaned and restored and located a little further down Dragon Street nearer the bus stop. It was noted that retail units that had been empty in the Dolphin complex in Dragon Street had recently been occupied so there was no reason why additional retail units would not be taken up. 31 parking

spaces were being provided which could be rented during the evening by the residents, but used by businesses during the day.

Cllr P Humphries left the meeting at 7:06 pm

Members asked several questions regarding construction materials and quality of the build, reminding Thorncliffe of the high expectations of the Petersfield Neighbourhood Plan. Members raised concerns about the tight space provided to construct, and that a good Construction Management Plan would be required. Thorncliffe shared that they had carried out lots of work in London in confined places, so could not foresee any problems. A question regarding deliveries to the retail units was asked, and Thorncliffe demonstrated how lorries would be able to access the complex, with plenty of space to manoeuvre their vehicle. The type of likely residents was questioned, and Thorncliffe felt that it was likely to be the older generation downsizing to live near the town centre.

It was noted that this had been a useful exchange of ideas and questions prior to a full planning application being made.

Cllr Oppenheimer added his comments to the electoral boundary discussion that in his view the idea of placing Sheet in a ward with Steep and Froxfield would not be the best option for Sheet, and that it should remain as part of Petersfield. He also felt that at least the boundary lines for district and town council wards should be shared.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT TO PETERSFIELD TOWN COUNCIL

OCTOBER 2017

1. Serving Hampshire consultation

The next phase of the County Council process to find £140m of savings by 2019 is for the Cabinet to bring forward detailed cost-reduction proposals. These proposals will then form the basis of a further public consultation.

A wide range of options is being considered including raising council tax, charging a nominal fare of 50p to those who have free bus passes, closing some household waste and recycling centres and withdrawing school crossing patrols.

The County Council is lobbying central Government hard to give us more powers to raise revenue by charging for services, to allow us to raise Council tax beyond the 5% limit if necessary, and also to clarify the future of adult care funding which is a major part of our expenditure in Hampshire.

Until we have clarity on the proposals I would suggest that it is a bit premature to consider making any representations. We will report back again in November once more detail has been published.

2. Future Skills Centre opens in Whitehill and Bordon

The Future Skills Centre is the latest in a series of new, world-class technical training facilities which we at HCC are delivering across the County with a view to transforming the skills infrastructure in Hampshire. This facility has the potential to be a great resource for young people in and around Petersfield.

The innovative new building, built by Hampshire County Council and substantially funded by the Enterprise M3 Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), was officially handed over, on 13 October 2017, to Basingstoke College of Technology, which is operating the centre, and providing its comprehensive range of vocational training courses in the construction sector, including apprenticeships.

The Home and Communities Agency secured an award of £3.8 million to fund the project, through the Local Growth Fund Grant from the Enterprise M3 Local Enterprise Partnership, and then selected the County Council to build the new facility and identify an operator. The County Council also put £250,000 towards the building costs for the new centre.

Although the focus is on training for the construction sector, the centre is the new local hub for technical training and will host a broad adult and community learning programme for the wider community.

The first cohort of students is already taking courses at the centre, developing skills in carpentry, brickwork, plumbing and the built environment. Both full time and part time study options are available, as well as apprenticeships.

At the opening ceremony, Damian Hinds MP said: "I was delighted to be part of the official opening of the Future Skills Centre, and to meet students already at work in the new facility. It's certainly an exciting time for the area and I would encourage any young person with an interest in construction to take a look at the courses available."

3. South Downs Local Plan consultation commences

The Pre-Submission version of the South Downs Local Plan opened for public consultation on 26 September and runs for 8 weeks until 21 November 2017. This will be the last opportunity for the public to comment before the plan is submitted to the Planning Inspectorate in Spring 2018. You can read the plan and respond to the consultation online at: www.southdowns.gov.uk/localplan

A key message which all NPA Members wish to stress is this: when responding, please comment on aspects of the plan which you support as well as those you wish to challenge. For example, if you support the proposed 50% affordable housing allocation please say so!

The South Downs Local Plan will, on adoption, replace more than a thousand existing local plan policies currently operating in different parts of the National Park with one set of 96 consistent policies.

The South Downs National Park Authority (SDNPA) is asking people to give their final comments this autumn and while they are mainly looking at the soundness of the plan they will also listen to comments on all other aspects of the plan. Every comment will

be passed to the Planning Inspectorate who will respond to them as part of their examination into the Local Plan.

This is a landscape-led plan, based on the statutory purposes and duty for National Parks as specified in the Environment Act 1995. These nationally important landscapes are the reason the South Downs were designated a National Park and must sit at the heart of every planning decision which the SDNPA makes.

4. Hampshire Supporting Troubled Families Programme on track

The tight finances at County level should not obscure the fact that there are some very good things happening which are making a difference to people's lives. I would like to highlight two projects which have delivered positive results: the supporting troubled families programme (STFP) and the provision of better support for mental health sufferers.

On STFP, there has been a positive evaluation of this crucial area of Council activity. A report to the Hampshire Cabinet has highlighted that Hampshire's STF programme is on track to meet the Government's new and more challenging targets around the number of families that need to be reached, and the intervention criteria achieved. By 2020, 5,540 Hampshire families will need to have been supported through the programme - more than double the number supported during the first phase of the scheme from 2012-2015.

By working closely with partner agencies, including the Police, schools and the Health Service, we are able to help families who are on the verge of crisis to make positive changes in their lives. They have been helped to get back into and stay in work, their children now attend school regularly and keep out of trouble outside of school, whilst their home lifestyles are safer and more settled. The benefits of this support are not only felt directly by the families on the programme, but also across the wider communities in which they live. Independent evaluation of the second phase of the Hampshire programme is being carried out by Southampton Solent University.

5. One-stop community shops for those needing mental health support.

New plans will see extended opening hours during evenings and weekends, and social care and NHS mental health specialist staff brought together within the centres. A 'one stop shop' approach will also be developed for more areas such as crisis support and support for young people and families.

Support from the centres can be accessed by dropping in or through GP referral.

The plans for the Wellbeing Centres will make it much easier for people to access support in their local community as they will be able to drop in to their nearest centre. Our priority is to ensure that mental health is afforded the same attention and priority as physical health, which is what we are working on with our partners in the NHS to achieve.

The improvement plans are part of a new £8 million contract funded by the County Council and Hampshire's Clinical Commissioning Groups, awarded to Andover Mind, Solent Mind and Havant and East Hampshire Mind. These voluntary sector organisations, with mental health expertise, will work together to run the Wellbeing Centres across the county, from this month.
